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FIRST MOCK EXAMINATION MARKING SCHEME ENGLISH LANGUAGE BASIC 9

PREAMBLE:

- 1. There are three parts A, B, C. Students are expected to answer three questions in all. One question from Part A and all the questions in both part B and C. If a student attempts more than one question from Part A, mark both and choose the better of the two.
- 2. The required length of each composition is about 250 words.
- 3. Mark allocation: Each composition is to be marked out of a total of 30 marks distributed as follows:

CONTENT - 10 MARKS
ORGANIZATION - 5 MARKS
EXPRESSION - 10 MARKS
MECHANICAL ACCURACY - 5 MARKS

- 4. If a candidate writes on a topic other than the one set, award zero for content and mark expression out of 5. The allocation for organization and mechanical accuracy remain unchanged.
- 5. The student is expected to know the basic rules of English Language. These include concord subject verb, noun pronoun agreement, etc, the use of capital letters and spellings. The student should also be able to use determiners and prepositions correctly and be capable of constructing sentences with all their vital components.

PENALIZE:

- * Each grammatical error.
- * Wrong spelling the wrong spelling of the same word should be penalized only once.
- * Faulty construction.
- * Punctuation error and wrong use of capital or small letter
- * Each of these should be ringed and half a mark (1/2) deducted up to a total of 5 marks.

- * Provide evidence or examples to support each negative effect mentioned.
- * Offer suggestions or alternative solutions to address the identified issues.

Organization: 5 marks

- * Use a formal letter format with appropriate salutation and closing.
- * Structure the letter with an introduction, body paragraphs, and a conclusion.
- * Ensure coherence and logical flow between paragraphs and ideas.
- * Use headings or bullet points to separate each negative effect for clarity.

Expression: 10 marks

- * Use clear and concise language throughout the letter.
- * Maintain a respectful and professional tone in addressing the Minister.
- * Avoid jargon or technical terms without proper explanation.
- * Demonstrate a strong command of language and vocabulary.

Accuracy: 5 marks

- * Check for grammar, spelling, and punctuation errors.
- * Use proper formatting, such as indentation and paragraph spacing.

Content: 10 marks

- * Originality and creativity of the plot.
- * Clarity and coherence of the storyline.
- * Relevance and depth of the theme.
- * Character development and engagement

Organization 5

- * Clear and logical structure with a well-defined beginning, middle, and end.
- * Smooth transitions between paragraphs and events.
- * use of storytelling techniques (flashbacks, foreshadowing,)

Expression: 10 marks

- * Descriptive and vivid language that creates imagery.
- * Varied sentence structures and use of literary devices.

Mechanical Accuracy: 5 marks

- * Proper grammar, punctuation, and spelling.
- * Consistency in tense and point of view.

Organization: 5 marks

- * Well-structured report with an introduction, body, and conclusion.
- * Logical flow of information.
- * Use of headings and subheadings for clarity.

Expression: 10 marks

- * Clear and concise writing style.
- * Use of appropriate vocabulary and language.
- * Proper grammar and sentence construction.

Accuracy: 5 marks

- * Correct spelling and punctuation.
- * Proper formatting and citation (if applicable).
