PART A ESSAY - 30 MARKS

Paper 2 consist of three parts. Part A, B and C. Candidates are expected to answer three questions in all. **One** question from **PART A** and Questions **4 & 5**. If a candidate attempts more than one question from PART A, mark BOTH and choose the best among the two.

The minimum length of each composition should be 250 words. Mark allocation should be distributed as follows.

CONTENT	_	10 marks
ORGANIZATION	_	5 marks
EXPRESSION	-	10 marks
MECHANICAL ACCURACY	-	5 marks

If a candidate writes on a topic other than the one given, award zero for **Content** and mark **Expression** out of 5. The allocations for **Organization** and **Mechanical Accuracy** remain unchanged.

Each error should attract a deduction of half a mark (½). Formal features of letters should have two rings only counted against the marks for Mechanical Accuracy. Subsequent errors in the formal features should be underlined only.

The candidate is expected to know the basic rules of English Language. These include concord: subject – verb agreement, noun – pronoun agreement, etc, the use of capital letters and correct spelling of words. The candidate should also be able to use determiners and prepositions correctly and be capable of constructing sentences with all their vital components.

PENALIZE

Each grammatical error

Wrong spelling - the wrong spelling of the same word should be penalized only once.

Faulty construction

Punctuation error and the wrong use of the capital or small letter.

Each of these errors should be circled and half a mark deducted up to a total of 5 marks.
