The more he tried to bring the leg, the worse the pain. He moaned andmoaned till he was completely exhausted.

Few hours later, the other colleagues who escaped boldly came back to the cemeteryto find the fate of their colleague. He was found in tears with the leg still planted in the hole. He was helped and the leg brought out with deep cuts. He was treated at ahospital and discharged.

The school authorities got the wind of it and gave him a severe punishment whichmade him to regret entirely. His parents were heavily disappointed in him for puttingup such an unscrupulous behaviour. The experience haunted him and he had no optionbut to be transferred to another school. It was a lesson to his friends.
